Rowing as Sport

- Row boats were ferries for people and small cargo before steam engines
- Competition naturally arose among professional boatmen wagering was part of the sport
- British, too, have a long history of rowing competition dating back at least to 1600's
- US competition began in the 1700's and grew to 150 regattas in 1872

1824: American Star Races "Certain Death"



- Captain of the British frigate Hussar puts up a \$1000 prize
- Dart (aka Certain Death) was a fast London built four oar rowed by Thames watermen.
- American Star was a New York "Whitehall"
- American Star wins by 400 yards.

Crowd of 50,000 crowded the shore and lined the wharfs to watch race from the Battery to Hoboken and back.

19th Century Four-oared Shell Racing

- Ward brothers of Cornwall
 Josh, Hank, Gilbert, Charles and later Ellis (5 of 9 brothers)
- Biglin brothers of Newburgh and later New York
 John, James, Philip and Barney (4 of 6 brothers)
- "Young Strangers" of PoughkeepsieHomer Wooden, Bill Stevens, Zek Beneway and John Best


Standing: Benjamin and Ellis; Seated: Hank, Charles, Gilbert and Josh; Foreground: Dick Risdon (manager)

Sons raised on the Hudson and became sloop men and world famous sportsmen.


Undefeated as a team of four or six oarsmen except for a single race.


Young Strangers Race Biglin Brothers in Poughkeepsie 1865



Pretty women followed by fancy men arrive days early. 20,000 spectators




Starting Cannon at Kaal Rock



Newburgh Bay Single Sculls Champions




John Hancon of Newburgh Reigned as Champion Sculler of America until 1858.

Josh Ward of Cornwall

Defeated John Hancon in Newburgh and was undefeated until 1862.





Walter Brown of Newburgh


Briefly Champion in 1866 when he traded victories with Josh Ward.

- \$4000 Purse (\$58,000 today)
- Pistols brandished during race
- Hamill rammed by Brown
- Hamill declared the winner

Collegiate Rowing Begins in US




Harvard racing Oxford on the Thames in London in 1869

- 1843 & 1844 Harvard & Yale form the first collegiate boat clubs
- 1852 1st intercollegiate competition on Lake Winnipesaukee, NH
- 1869 Collegiate rowing surged in popularity following Harvard - Oxford race. NY Times covered race with entire front page.

- 1875: 3 mile race before a crowd of ~25,000 won by Cornell
 - Ivy League: Brown, Cornell, Columbia, Dartmouth, Harvard, Princeton, and Yale
 - O Now Division III: Amherst, Bowdoin, Hamilton, Union, Wesleyan, and Williams

Professional vs Amateur Rowing


- Early racing included both professionals and amateurs
- 1870 1876 Rowing Association of American Colleges
 - First formal athletic conference Harvard, Brown, Amherst and Bowdoin
 - Only undergraduate students could compete
 - Foundation of NCAA rules of eligibility today
 - Could not use professional coaches copied from British
- 1872 National Association of Amateur Oarsmen (NAAO)
 - 1870's Growing affluence, leisure time, and cities supported rowing growth
 - Motivation to distinguish gentlemen (amateurs) from laborers (pros)
 - Avoid influence of betting?
- 1929 College rowers joined NAAO
- Professional vs Amateur in sports continues to be debated



IRA Timeline

- 1891 1894 Intercollegiate Rowing Association (IRA) formed
 - o Original members: Columbia, Cornell, U of Pennsylvania
 - Later joined by Syracuse & Navy
- 1895 1st Regatta in Poughkeepsie
- 1921 Regatta grew to de facto national championship Wisconsin (1897), Syracuse (1901), Navy (1907) Stanford (1912), Washington (1913), California (1921)
 - (Except 1897, Harvard & Yale did not participate until 2003)
- 1949 Last race in Poughkeepsie with 13 crews
- 1950 to Today Moved around (Marietta, OH, Syracuse, NY, Camden, NJ) and today in Mercer Lake, West Windsor, NJ
- 1968 Race changed from 3 miles to 2000 meters (1½ miles)

EBRIGHT, OF CALIFORNIA

Carroll M. "Ky" Ebright, for 12 seasons rowing coach at California, has an outstanding record in Olympic rowing annals. His 1928 and 1932 crews were winners at Poughkeepsie and the Olympics, with records of 13 and 7 straight victories, respectively, at all distances from 2,000 meters to four miles. His 'Varsity crew again won at Poughkeepsie in 1934 and 1935, and also at the International Spring Regatta at Long Beach, following the Poughkeepsie Regatta last year.

ULBRICKSON, OF WASHINGTON

Alvin Ulbrickson, head coach at Wash ington since 1927, stroked the Washington Varsity in '24, '25 and '26, winning at Poughkeepsie twice. As coach, he hit his stride in 1930, and his crews have set Coast records since that time. In 1933, the 'Varsity won the Olympic Games International Spring Championship in California, and the Pacific Coast Championship, winning the latter again in 1934, 1935, and 1936.

Poughkeepsie Railroad Bridge (now the Walkway Over the Hudson), and images of it were commonly official regatta site, advertisers used the race to draw tourists to the area.




Railroad Provided Transport for Spectators & Boats

Why Race in Poughkeepsie?

- 4 mile straight course and wide enough for 13 boats
- Easy Access for Spectators
 - Railroad crossroads with new bridge (Walkway Over the Hudson)
 - NYC & Albany passenger steamers
- Observation train to follow races
- Crew, boat and spectator accommodations
- Supportive local civic leaders

In the varsity-eight race, the Bears held on to beat the Huskies with a show of guts, while Princeton's lightweightsmen and women-had an historically victorious regatta.

al swept the heavyweight events, rinceton swept the men's and omen's lightweight eights, and Williams won both Division III eights at the 2023 Intercollegiate Rowing Association National Championship Regatta in early June on Mercer Lake in West Windsor, N.J.

The Cal Golden Bears won the varsity four, third-varsity eight, second-varsity eight, varsity eight, and Ten Eyck points trophy. Although Washington challenged Cal in the national-championship varsityeight race, pushing the Bears in the last 500 meters, Cal held on for the victory in 5:31.7.


"Honestly, the first time all year we had to go through our full race and really step it up. The Huskies were moving. And we pushed back," said Cal coach Scott Frandsen. "We had the guts, in that moment of intense duress, of who's tougher.



Why was the regatta moved in 1950?

- Poughkeepsie less attractive to IRA post WWII
 - Observation train no longer available
 - Boat houses falling into disrepair.
 - City reluctant to invest more money
- Marietta Ohio more attractive
 - No tides
 - Dormitory housing within two blocks of the boat houses
 - Marietta made a financial offer to the IRA
- Difficulty finding a permanent home
 - Marietta had two successive years of flooding
 - Regatta moved to Syracuse and eventually Camden, NJ

Mid Hudson School Boy Rowing Association d/b/a Mid Hudson Rowing Association

- 1950 Founded by Poughkeepsie Chamber of Commerce, Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Italian Center
 - Supported Roosevelt, Arlington and Poughkeepsie High School Crews
 - Maintained equipment and docks and provided coaches
- Sponsored scholastic races in Poughkeepsie
 - Triangular race to determine top local crew still held today
 - Mid Hudson Invitational Regatta with up to 20 schools
 - 2010 replaced by NY State Scholastic Championships in Saratoga Springs
 - Sponsored National Scholastic Championships in 1954 and 1964
- 1960's High Schools began running their own programs after the Washington boathouse burned down in 1957

- 1998 High School Coaches joined together to form Hudson River Rowing Association to address the need for a community boathouse
- Early 2000's Poughkeepsie lease of Cornell Boathouse expired
- 2006 Community boathouse dedicated built for \$3 Million on property donated by Vassar College


