## **Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting**

Minutes, December 2, recorded by Tom Elliott

Ken and Ben gave us Woody Guthrie's *Hard Tavelin'* and Rob brought the meeting to order at 7:30pm, welcoming all. Terry agreed to take home the refuse and Mary the recyclables. Rob thanked Loren for being the Multrum hero this month. First time visitors included Jaime and Jordan from Goshen. Also, who Elaine sailed with the Woody 40 years back, and Kevin, who was with the club 20 years ago were both visiting. Wayne paid young Jordan's membership to the club. Thanks, Wayne! Next came reports.

**Treasurer's Report:** Aaron gave the Treasurer's report for October, which is in the newsletter, below. A member asked, "is the *Interest Earned on Investment* from a socially responsible source?" Aaron said, yes, it is! Rob thanked Aaron.

**Finance Report:** Alan told members that the committee recommended adding \$5,000 to the Woody Long-term Maintenance Fund, and also, to invest \$15,000 of those funds in a one-year CD, which will earn over 4 % starting next quarter. This will be included in the budget presented to members in January. Rob thanked Alan.

Holiday Sing: Susan told us the event is December 10 at 5 pm in the clubhouse. Aaron brought in posters for everyone to see. It's a free event, and our big Holiday show. Aaron will be decorating, and performers include Ben and Ingrid, David and Jake Bernz, Judith Tulloch, Lydia Adams-Davis, Mary Poppiins, Trouble Sisters, and Rob May, among others. Donations will be accepted at the event for Common Ground Food Banks. Bring finger foods (sweet and savory) and beverages of choice. Rob thanked Susan for her report.

Woody Report: Max reported that the Woody is now in Haverstraw, fully protected under its bolt-together covered frame. There will be a little maintenance in Haverstraw, and a Block Party at the clubhouse (maintaining blocks and rigging) which takes no experience (date to be announced). Spring transit should occur the last week of March or the following week in April. There is some prep to do before we put the mast back down at White's in New Hamburg, and then a lot of prep back in Beacon Harbor. Max sent a volunteer signup around and encouraged those who haven't to give it a try. Rob thanked Max for his report.

Harbor Report: Captain Steve told us the harbor moorings are all put away and tomorrow the docks will travel up to New Hamburg for the winter with Chris White in his dock caravan. We have some flotation repairs to do, but it should be a quiet winter. Rob thanked Steve for his report. Vanessa added that the Harbor committee plans to meet with the Board to discuss working with the Coast Guard Auxiliary, who seeks to form a Flotilla here. They hope to be able to use the clubhouse for their meetings. There is also interest in establishing a Beacon/Newburg Sea Scouts program, and Vanessa is willing to use her boat as a training vessel.

**Fireplace Insert:** Rob told the membership that the issue of removing the fireplace insert from the fireplace is on the ballot for tonight's voting. He asked for members to give their ideas about the choice before voting for officers goes forward. Ken, a chimney sweep and wood stove expert,

explained that inserts are wood stoves designed to fit into fireplaces, fitted with a motorized fan that blows heat into the room (but not smoke). Fireplaces are low efficiency, and inserts increase efficiency greatly. They also use a third of the wood a regular fireplace uses. Susan, who helped build the fireplace, spoke about the goal it fulfilled for club founder, Pete Seeger, in developing our Sloop Club community. In a song written by Pete and others, it provided a cozy and beautiful space where we could gather. The song's lyrics concluded with, "Friends and neighbors, lend a hand, Share the light, build our plans." Others spoke about safety, heating efficiency and smoke. Many spoke in favor of the insert, which changes, but doesn't disturb the actual fireplace structure. Some felt if Pete, an environmentalist, were here today, he would favor the insert.

Nominations: Nominations for Board officers can be made up until the time of the vote. Rob asked if there were any new nominations for Secretary(none); for Treasurer(none); for Vice President Vanessa was nominated and her nomination was seconded. She accepted the nomination. For President (Steve was nominated, but he declined). Rob asked the candidates if they would like to speak about their goals. Each candidate did so in turn. Secret ballots were collected for counting.

**Clearwater Report:** Rosemary told us that Clearwater is in Kingston for winter maintenance and suggested we organize a Sloop Club maintenance day (date to be announced) She told us it is annual appeal time for Clearwater, and suggested we give generously. Rob thanked her for the report.

**Election Results:** 2023 officers are: President, Rob May, Vice President, Vince Farina, Treasurer, Aaron Verdile, and Secretary, Mary Arnold.Proposition 1: The vote was No. The fireplace insert remains in place.

Announcements: Alan Z. announced that Beacon Riverpool will hold its annual meeting on December 10 from 10 to 12 pm at Stony Kill Farm. New leadership is needed. and he encouraged all interested to attend. Please RSVP on the Riverpool website. Bonnie spoke about the MLK walk, one of Pete's initiatives. The theme for essays this year is "It's Always Right to Do the Right Thing." Bonnie hopes to move the time of the walk to the early afternoon next year to conform to schedule changes with the Southern Dutchess Coalition. Please support the event. Susan told us Lydia had left some china plates as a donation to anyone who would like them. J.C. Calderone told us of a conference being hosted by the the Westchester Chapter of AIA, sponsored by NYSERDA, among others, and was looking for help in promoting it in environmental circles. The event, Equity & the Environment: The Challenges for AIA & NOMA in 2023 & Beyond, is on Dec. 14, with many interesting panelists involved. Joyce told us the Holiday Sing is a benefit for Common Ground, and any checks should be written to the Beacon Sloop Club with a memo to that organization. Wayne had one more stainless-steel bento box to sell and donate to the sloop club. Nancy took it for \$20. Thanks, Wayne and Nancy!

Rob asked for a motion to adjourn. Steve made the motion, Tom seconded it, and it was carried unanimously at 9:15

#### Have an Eco-Friendly Holiday

If you would like to avoid being swept up in the wave of holiday consumerism and waste, there are may things that you can do to reduce your environmental impact. In no particular order:

- 1. Switch to LED holiday lights. They use 80% less energy than incandescent lights. If everyone in the U.S. switched, we could save 9.9 B pounds of greenhouse gas emissions (USDE).
- 2. Take a tip from Toshi and make your own wrapping paper out of recyclable materials. 2.3 million lbs. of wrapping paper ends up in landfills every holiday season.
- 3. Shop locally and look for low-impact gifts. This also helps to support our community and supporters. Avoid plastic and plastic packaging.
- 4. Use local, organic foods when preparing your holiday meals.
