Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, March 2, 2012

Welcome. After Michael Scolnick and James Malchow led the club in a newly composed, "Raise the Sail" fundraising song, Rosemary Thomas raised the sail on the Woody Guthrie donation sloop to record our progress against the \$1500 matching grant.

Club President David Eberle welcomed first-time visitors – from Beacon, Cold Spring, Beacon, Hunter Mt., Rutgers, and New Brunswick, NJ., including Rebecca Menendez, Kathy Nolan (Catskill Mt.Keeper), and Ken McCormick.

Treasurer's Report. Sarah Elisabeth reported expenses and income for the month. The opening balance was \$42,197 and the closing balance, \$45,662. The full treasure's report appears elsewhere in the *Broadside*.

Building & Patio. Claudine Craig thanked Saul Rozinsky for the new (used) gate for our fence. It looks wonderful. A grant of \$11,700 for repair of damage from Irene (sheetrock and roofing) was received from Hudson River Improvement Fund. A condition of the grant requires that the work be done by May 13th. We will be meeting with the contractor and then notifying the City. We will need volunteers to help contain the cost. ** The fan for the Multrum will be installed soon. We have the fan. We have the volunteer.

Environmental Committee. Alan Thomas, reporting for Steve van der Merwe, noted that the February meeting, concerning impacts on Hudson River waters by Andrew Meyer and Emily Vail from the DEC, was packed. Presentations occur on the third Friday of the month through May at 7pm. The next talk will be March 16th. A schedule appears elsewhere in the Broadside.

Woody Report. Tom LaBarr. The Woody continues under tarp at White's Marina, as usual in the winter. Tom reminded those present that volunteer work opportunities are listed on the Woody sailor site and Facebook pages. Winter maintenance begins this Sunday and continues every Sunday from 10am – 2pm. It's not just for sailors.

The Block Party, the annual, pre-season work party to fix, renovate, oil and polish the above-deck blocks and other moving parts for the Woody, was hosted by Tony Aquisto this year. Thank you to Tony and Mary for opening their house to a large group of sailors.

Tom LaBarr announced the **Annual Woody Dinner**, March 3rd at the Riverview Terrace and that a few spots were still available.


34th Anniversary Party



In two separate decisions New York State judges ruled that local municipalities may prohibit natural gas drilling within their boundaries. Both judges found precedent for local government's control of land uses under zoning authority granted by the state. While the rulings are likely to be appealed, they represent a milestone in the fracking debate in New York State.

A Packed House for Our February Lecture

We would like to again thank Andrew Meyer and Emily Vail from the DEC for a great talk and a lively



discussion regarding ongoing studies of the local effects of tropical storms Irene and Lee and strategies for mitigating the impacts of storm water runoff.

Andrew presented data illustrating the critical role that wetlands play in the retention of storm water and the relative impacts of Irene and Lee in areas with differing wetland capacity. Some differences are fixed due to geography; some are the result of disruption due to human activities.

Emily showed how green development practices can be used to slow the runoff of storm water and increase the capacity of the landscape to absorb it. She showed many local examples such as permeable pavement, day-lighting of streams, and naturalizing stream banks that are being put to practice. She discussed local and state regulations and encouraged everyone to get involved in the planning process in their communities.
