From the Archives – 1984 Something to aspire to

Highlights "Zone Out Fossil Fuel Power" Panel Discussion

It was refreshing to attend the April 17th "panel discussion at SUNY New Paltz to hear a student and local politicians talk about power plants, global warming, and how we can partner against these threats, even with our busy lives. The opening speaker was New Paltz student Brenna Rathbone member of the New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG). She explained that power plants are looking for business in the Hudson Valley as we are in "Power Zone G" along with New York City. Therefore we pay higher fuel prices, and power plants in our zone can make more money. She was pleased that the Town of Ulster just created a moratorium against a proposed plant.

Jan Metzger, State Senator, whose 42nd District, includes all of Sullivan and parts of Orange, Ulster, and Delaware Counties, said that town moratoriums are one way to delay fossil power plants. "We must also change the way we live," repeating the phase "repair, reuse, rethink." She supports using repair cafes for repairing household items, and using food waste, as 40% of our food is wasted. This creates 15% of all greenhouse gases while 2.5 million people in New York are "food challenged."

Senator Peter Harckham, whose 40th district covers a wide range of Westchester, said that \$90 billion was spent this year on weather related recovery due to increasingly stronger storms in the U.S. "There are those who think other sources of energy are needed if Indian Point Power closes, but because of its age, this plant has closed down in the past and New York City lights stayed on." He stressed educating the public as he found some college students who did not know benzene is carcinogenic. He understood that many people work several jobs, or have a long commute reducing their time.

Manna Jo Greene, Environmental Director of Clearwater, supports rethinking construction projects to include green construction, and the need to protect forests, wetlands, and oceans, which draw in carbon. Refrigerators must to be checked to avoid HFC leakage. Heat pumps may leak. She invited people to call Clearwater who will train folks in climate change and solutions.

Attorney Hayley Carlock, Scenic Hudson Director of Environmental Advocacy, said it is easier for power plants with small outputs to get permits so they are. She suggested town-zoning codes regarding air pollution, storm drainage, water pollution, noise, potential for explosions and fires, vicinity to schools, and air particulates. Also, a certain time period moratoriums while these issues and others are scrutinized. The Town of Lloyd delayed a power plant this way.

Even though folks are busy, they can vote for politicians who have a record of supporting non-fossil fuel energy. Call Governor Cuomo and urge him to stop the Newburgh Danskammer fracked gas power plant (888-925-7006), and attend local town meetings when the subject of clean energy is discussed. There is a free NY State "Energy Star Program" which will inspect your home to suggest how to save energy. They will also advise developers and new builders.

Governor Cuomo Bans Plastic Bags in New York on Earth Day

KINGSTON, NY – At a press conference on Monday, April 22 at Clearwater's Kingston Home Port and Education Center at the Hudson River Maritime Museum, Governor Cuomo announced his signing of legislation banning single use plastic bags in New York State.

Beacon Sloop Club Youth Sailing Program

It was announced at the general meeting of the Beacon Sloop Club that the club will be sponsoring a Young Sailors Program with the intent of creating a program to acquaint young people in the arts of the sailor, to instill in them a sense of stewardship for the environment and to train them in the sailing of the Woody Guthrie.

The ultimate goal of the program will be to recruit, train and put on the water a cadre of youth, both boys and girls, between the ages of 13 and 18 who can fulfill all crew positions required for sailing the Woody Guthrie. Although the exact dates have not been finalized it is proposed that beginning in late May meetings will take place on Saturdays at the Sloop Club clubhouse from noon to 4 PM. Each meeting will include approximately one hour of instruction in the arts of the sailor and weather permitting, sailing on the Woody Guthrie.

Michael Barnett, who is heading up the project, is looking for adults who are proficient in sailing the Woody and are able to devote some time on Saturdays to help out with the training and sailing and of course we are looking for young people who would be interested in participating in this exciting new program.


