Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, August 3, 2017

The meeting began at 7:30 p.m. with Susan Boszo leading the club in singing Fifty Sail on Newburgh Bay. Vince Farina presided over the meeting in Susan Berliner's absence. New attendees were welcomed from Hudson, Newburgh, and Peekskill.

Aaron Verdile gave the Treasury report. The opening balance for the month of June was \$76,800 and the closing balance was \$84,300. Discussion was held about the club's process for acknowledging donations. Margaret DeHeus agreed to handle thank you letters, with some assistance from others.

Rosemary Thomas, Joyce Hanson, and Bonnie Champion reported on the Corn Festival. We will have 1000-1500 ears of local corn. We need volunteers for lots of jobs, including selling corn and watermelon, earth-care, chili, and other jobs. Rosemary said it is important to have volunteers because the festival is about more than food and music; the festivals make a difference in public opinion about the river. A new feature of this year's festival will be a cornbread contest. Participants can bring a cornbread, which must be made from scratch and have its ingredients listed. Joyce displayed new Corn Festival t-shirts that are for sale. Betty Harkins later mentioned that there will be macroinvertebrate and Stony Kill Farm displays at the E-Tent.

Vince Farina reported that the Woody maintenance work party originally scheduled for August 4th has been postponed due to the weather forecast. Steve Schwartz reported that the Woody's season is in full swing and people should book their sails. Joyce Hanson discussed the dinner raffle and encouraged people to buy tickets. It was suggested that one method for the boat to earn money and to ensure guests will show up would be for people to put a deposit on their reservation and have it returned to them when they arrived to sail. Steve Schwartz said that would not be in accordance with the boat's mission or tradition.

David Eberle said that there will be a work party on September 8 to continue work on the north roof of the clubhouse. The primary area left to replace is the multrum roof.

Alan Thomas said that we were given four family passes to the Hudson River Maritime Museum. He offered them to people who would be interested in using them.

The meeting moved to announcements. Joyce Hanson announced that on August 14, Movies that Matter Beacon will feature Josh Fox's one man show. Susan Boszo invited everyone to the post-meeting song circle and said that the song circle is now a part of the Songfarmer Collective, and may be included in a program on PBS about song circles. Alan Zollner thanked the club on behalf of River Pool for its assistance with the River Swim, especially the volunteer sailors, set-up crew, swimmers, donors, and more. Bonnie Champion reiterated Alan's thanks. Bonnie Champion said there is a traveling replica of the Vietnam War Memorial on display in Newburgh through Sunday, August 5. Aaron Verdile announced that he is doing a charitable giving seminar at his office on October 17. Arthur Christie said he has a 25' wooden sloop for sale. See the newsletter for details.

The meeting adjourned at 8:18 pm.

Sebastian's Sweet Cornbread

Ingredients:

- 3/4 Cup Corn Meal
- 1-1/4 Cup Flour
- 1/4 Cup Sugar
- 2 Tsp Baking Powder
- 1/4 Melted Butter
- 1 Egg
- 1-1/4 Cup Milk

Recipe:

- Preheat oven to 400°
- · Mix all dry ingredients in a bowl
- · Stir in melted butter slowly
- · Fold in Milk and Eggs
- · Pour batter into a 9 inch cast iron pan
- · bake for 22 minutes

The Woody Report

Our dedicated captains and crews have been busy, with the corn festival, Garrison, and weeknight sails. The weather has been a bit of a challenge, but we have not missed a beat. Our crews are back up to strength, with many new sailors. We also want to thank our shore support team, and especially those who rowed and insured safe boarding of our guests.





Danskammer Energy Center

Danskammer Energy LLC filed a plan in May with the state Public Service Commission for the Danskammer Energy Center, converting the existing power plant to a natural gas-powered turbine and a steam turbine facility, increasing the capacity to between 525 and 575 megawatts.

The proposed facility would include an "air-cooled condensing" system rather than relying on water drawn from the Hudson River. The current system is a major environmental concern, killing fish and fish larvae in its intake system.

The current Danskammer plant is a gas-powered peaking facility that powers up during periods of high demand. Company spokesmen are touting the new Energy Center as needed to fill gaps due to the closing of Indian point in 2021 and as a compliment to renewable sources during times of intermittent generation.

Danskammer Energy is proposing a public participation process that will include forums and a website, as well as approval from Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and New York State.

Danskammer Energy is owned private equity firm Tiger Infrastructure.
