Minutes, February 2, 2017

Song: Groundhog Day Blues

Welcome. Happy Birthday to Bonnie.

<u>Budget</u>: No Treasurer's Report. Budget presentation by Aaron. The dock work for this year includes a one-time expense. The committees and executive board has reviewed the budget. There is a tremendous amount of work to put the Day at Sloop Brewing together and the company is opening a brewery in East Fishkill so we are not doing it this year. Motion to accept the budget. **Motion passes** unanimously.

MLK by Bonnie: Bonnie wanted to give the biggest thank you in the world. The weather was cooperative. We made the front page of the Poughkeepsie Journal. Bonnie recommends that folks join the gospel choir. Poughkeepsie Journal website includes a video. The Sloop Club banner was prominent and the Sloop music was heard.

Woody Report by Tom: The Woody is still floating in Haverstraw. Everything looks fine so far. The plan is to come out on March 31 and be pulled at White's Marina for maintenance (barnacle removal, hull painting) and rigging. The plan is be sailing the Woody in late April. There will be work parties, sailor's meeting, and block party (grease and inspect the lines). Need more crews on Monday, and Tuesday. The winter sailing course will start in about a month – Jim will advertise.

Woody dinner by Tom: Tom is still looking for a place. He is trying to keep it in Beacon. Tom is hoping to get the last Sunday in March.

<u>Lecture Series</u> by Alan: Next Tuesday 2/6 at 7pm – Age of Aquarius (Space Science); 3/8 – The Art of Barrel making by John Cox; 4/12 – Woody rebuild; and 5/10 – Iona Island. Alan needs help putting up flyers for the 2/6 event. The barrels are made of New York oak. Alan also needs help before the lecture to clean up and someone to bring snacks.

<u>Multrum</u> by Susan: Susan asked for volunteers to tend to the multrum. Alan Zolner offered to clean it in March. Margaret offered to clean it April, May, and June.

<u>Frances Memorial</u> by Susan: Sunday February 11 will be another memorial at 12:30 for Frances Cott.

Hurricane Maria Recovery experience: Antony spoke about his 18-day deployment to Puerto Rico as part of his agency's response to Hurricane Irma/Maria. He has returned about a couple of weeks ago. The main island is still about 1/3 without power and many homes damaged. Antony spent his time as an assistant safety officer and part of the household hazardous waste removal team. His mission was assigned by incident command to assist with safety and help EPA collaborate with other government agencies to collect possible household hazardous waste and assist with safety. His fluency in Spanish helped him communicate with local residents and once residents got over the skepticism, they were grateful the U.S. EPA was knocking on doors. His experience in Puerto Rico was sobering and humbling.

His tour was during the holidays as January 6 is Three Kings Day, and the whole island typically celebrates with street music, toys, family time, and happiness. This year the holidays seemed present but subdued. For the most part, folks are still trying to get by without power. Antony and his team searched for paint cans, cleaning solvents, oils and other toxins to help residents remove them from the debrisfilled homes and neighborhoods. They educated residents about hazardous waste and collected batteries, paint, cleaning solvents, oils, propane cylinders, electronic waste, and more for disposal. Antony monitored working conditions for his team in the intense heat and humidity while also keeping the team safe. Antony was glad that EPA has boots on the ground to keep the focus on the future. There was discussion on what the club could do to help.

The Art of Barrel Making:

w/ Cooper John Cox

A Free Event

- A brief history of barrel making
- The cultural heritage of coopering in the Hudson valley
- A primer on barrel construction and mathematics.
- A display and discussion of 18th century hand tools and their use in traditional barrel crafting.



After 27 years of custom cabinetmaking in Philadelphia and New York, John Cox decided to open a cooperage. After a hard-spent 2 years of research, tool acquisition, and trials he went into production. He operates the Quercus Cooperage in High Falls, NY, producing watertight barrels without the use of fasteners our glue.

On Thursday March 8th at 7:00 pm The Beacon Sloop Club's 2018 Winter Lecture Series will present *The Art of Barrel Making* – with local cooper John Cox.


Mr. Cox will cover a brief history of barrel making, the entomology of the terms, the cultural heritage of coopering in the Hudson valley and a primer on barrel construction and mathematics. He will also display and discuss his 18th century hand tools and their use in traditional barrel crafting.

As the craft brewing and distilling boom took hold in New York and elsewhere, the demand for barrels, firkins, and other traditional products soared. Mr. Cox founded Quercus Cooperage in High Falls to help meet that demand. Using local New York white oak, he produces watertight casks without the use of fasteners or glue, contributing to the artisan spirit of his customers.

There is a long history of barrel making in the Hudson Valley, where wet and dry goods were transported in barrels down the Hudson River aboard sloops. With prohibition and the advent of modern packaging much of the craftsmanship and industry was lost.
