Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, January 3, 2014

The meeting began at 7:30 with R.J. Storm leading the club in singing "Victory is Mine." Saul Rozinsky was introduced as the new president for 2014. Saul introduced Sarah Elisabeth to give the Treasury Report. The closing balance is \$159,790. It was noted that \$6,000 came from the sale of the car that Jim Krivo left the club. The report was approved.

Jim Birmingham gave the Woody Report. Jim said the Woody needs a lot of work and he thanked everyone who has worked to help the boat restoration. He said the boat had a survey done and the survey found that the boat is unfit to use for its intended and estimates vary between builder and scale of work. Guest sails will almost certainly not happen in 2014 but the club's other boats are available for members who still want to get out on the water. One suggestion is to have a boat building program in the absence of the public sail program. The club can build a whitehall row boat. Ken Miller gave details about some local whitehall building programs. Betty Harkins asked if repairs on the Woody will begin soon or if we are waiting until we have more money. Jim said we will wait until we have a clear plan of what is to be done.

James Malchow reported that on January 18th there will be an open boat party at the Clearwater barn in Kingston at 4:00. There will also be a Sloop Club Congress at the barn prior to the party at 1:00.

Alan Thomas announced that the first lecture in the winter lecture series is titled "Bikeable Beacon." It will be held in the Sloop Club on Thursday, January 16th at 7:00. The rest of the lectures are being planned. Alan also announced that the Greenpeace Arctic 30 have been released and he thanked all sloop club members who helped get them released.

Alan Thomas announced that on February 27th is the annual Woody Dinner. This year's dinner is being held at the Towne Crier Cafe. Tickets are \$75 per person.

Discussion moved to the club's donation of \$1000 from Chevron. Saul Rozinsky explained the background of the donation and said the donation became controversial because of Chevron's environmental record. In December a vote was held to accept the money and not return it to Chevron and now the question is what is to be done with it. Saul announced that the club's Board approved Connie Hogarth's proposal as an agenda item. Connie read her proposal which called for \$1000 to be given to the Pachamama Alliance. Discussion was held about the proposal both in favor and against the proposal. After comments from each side were given, a vote was held. By a vote of 20-9 the club approved Connie's proposal. David Eberle made a motion to create a matching grant of up to \$1000 to make up the spent funds. A hat pass collected \$150, which David matched.

Connie Hogarth then read a proposed press release drafted by her and Rosemary Thomas on the donation to Pachamama. The press release was approved. Gail Moran asked if there would also be a press conference. It was agreed that the possibility would be explored. James Malchow asked the club for a resolution thanking Tom LaBarr for all the work he has done both for the club and community. The resolution passed unanimously.

Discussion moved to the Woody Dinner. Various details were discussed. Approximately half of the cost of each ticket goes to the Woody and the club is trying to be sure that those who cannot afford the cost of the ticket are still able to attend.

Steve Schwartz announced that the film "Crude" is going to be shown at the club on Friday, January 24th at 7:00p.m. The film is meant to educate the club and public about Chevron and its issues in South America. David Eberle added that the club will have a guest speaker in the future about ethical decisions for non-profits.

Lydia Adams Davis announced that she has a concert on January 11th at 11:00a.m. at the Howland Center.

Vane Lashua announced that he has papers and flyers to help people sign up for health care under the new law.

Lydia Adams Davis announced that on January 6th at the Springfield Baptist Church is the next rehearsal for the Martin Luther King Parade. The rehearsal begins at 6:30p.m.

Alan Thomas announced that Vane Lashua is the chair of the membership committee and most membership renewals are due in January. In recent years membership renewals have been disappointingly low and the committee hopes to turn that around.

The meeting broke at 8:35 p.m.

In Memoriam- Michael Sherker



Michael Sherker was a very talented and extraordinarily creative artist, painting abstract work throughout his life. More recently, Michael did the art work for a children's book that he and his partner, Claudine Craig, published called The Sheep That Swam. Michael was also a musician who performed and sang; he had a beautiful voice.

Michael earned his Ph.D. in Fine Arts from Columbia University. He was a native of New York City and his career as an art and ceramics professor at Kingsborough College in Brooklyn spanned thirty years. During his tenure at Kingsborough College, Michael built kilns for the art department.

Michael was always involved in projects, exhibiting significant strength and energy with his efforts. He first arrived to the Hudson Valley as a counselor at the Settlement Camp when he was nearly fifteen. He made the Hudson Valley his permanent residence after he retired from teaching. Michael was a long-time Beacon Sloop Club member, regularly contributing to causes.

Michael had a lovely sense of humor; he was kind and would offer help to anyone in need.

Captain Peter Wilcox and the Arctic 30 have been pardoned by an act of the Russian parliament and allowed to leave Russia and return to their homes! Certainly this tremendous news is the result of the public outcry at the ridiculousness of the charges and the treatment that these peaceful protestors received.

Again thank you to all of you, who signed the cards at the meeting, wrote letters, signed petitions, joined the online protests, spread the word, and otherwise brought pressure to bear on the Russians. Your voices were heard.

"Our ship was illegally seized at sea, detained and taken to Murmansk, where we were put in prison and accused of a crime we didn't commit. Now more than 100 days later, we're relieved to have received the amnesty, but we have nothing to apologize for. This was an entirely peaceful protest, the right thing to do and as a result, millions more people are now aware of the risks of drilling in the Arctic.

"We'd like to thank our supporters all over the world who put the pressure on Russian authorities and who were ultimately responsible for getting us out of jail. But it's not over yet. We need to end our dependence on oil. We already have more oil than we can safely burn without destroying the climate. This campaign will not stop until the globe has switched to renewable energy."

New York State Issues Long-Term Energy Plan

An estimated 2000 protestors rallied against hydraulic fracturing in Albany today as Governor Cuomo gave his annual State-of-the-State address. There were many familiar faces in the crowd.

Meanwhile, on Tuesday the state Energy Planning Board approved New York's long-term energy plan taking no position on fracking. It does call for the expanded use of natural gas instead of oil to reduce harmful air emissions. Absent were the 2009 plans claims of economic and energy gains from expanding production from the Marcellus Shale.

The plan instead focuses on increased use of renewable energy and clean technology including solar, wind, bioenergy, geothermal and hydrokinetic energy sources, and projects utility bills will be among the lowest in the country. It calls for a reduction of carbon emissions from the energy sector of 50 percent by 2030.

There is a 60-day public comment period and six public hearings will be held on the plan. You can read and comment on the plan at:

Mark Roland has lived in Beacon since 2001. For 7 years he was proprietor of the Iron Fish Trading Co, selling second-hand goods, antiques, and used bicycles. He is a co-founder of Beacon Deserves Better, a citizens group that fought a large development proposed for the city's waterfront. He first proposed the idea of bicycle sharrows, or shared lane markings, for Main Street, and was a catalyst in seeing that project to fruition. He was also appointed to several planning and rezoning committees under two mayors.

While living in New York City in the 80s and 90s, he founded and published a magazine called In Traffic, The Metro Cycling Journal. He currently works at Starn Studios in Beacon, and runs Wigwam, a website and quarterly dedicated to home economics.




