## A Message from Our President

It was cold, dark, and quiet outside in Beacon on December 9th. But inside the Beacon Sloop Club, it was warm, bright, colorful, and cheerful. Aaron Verdile and Trish Murphy spent the day beautifully decorating the clubhouse for the annual Beacon Sloop Club Holiday Sing. The celebration was joyful, filled with good music, and delicious food. Many thanks to all those who organized and attended the celebration. We reserve a special "thank you" for Joyce Hanson, who spearheaded the Common Ground Food Donation Program fundraiser at the event, raising over \$1,000 to distribute nutritional food to those who may be in need during this holiday season.

It seems appropriate at this juncture to take stock of the past year and look forward to the new one. By all measures, 2023 was a success. Membership has returned to prepandemic levels. Many newer members have infused the Club with renewed energy, fresh ideas, and originality, while our veterans provide stability, experience, wisdom, and dedication. The BSC sailing classes were at peak capacity and our public sailing program was as popular as ever. We produced three lively, memorable, and wellattended festivals.

Our finances are stable, thanks to Treasurer Aaron Verdile and the Finance Committee. Due to the efforts of Alan Thomas and James Malchow, the Club received two generous grants, intended to help us in our mission to preserve the Hudson River. Our Winter Lecture Series brought us entertaining and enlightening programs last winter. Exciting lecturers have been scheduled for this year by our Winter Lecture Series coordinators, Alan Thomas, and Steve van der Merwe.

Joining with other environmental groups, we led the way to significant environmental victories in 2023. Most notably, we helped persuade state lawmakers to codify a law protecting the Hudson from the discharge of radioactive waste. Additionally, we assisted in guiding the Beacon City Council into passing the All-Electric Buildings Act, requiring new buildings to feature clean energy sources. Also, we have redoubled efforts to make club activities more environmentally sustainable, decreasing the amount of waste at our general meetings, and reducing the environmental footprint of our festivals.

However, many challenges await us in the new year. Proposals to expand the pipeline under the Hudson, near Indian Point, have surfaced. Concerns persist that oil tankers may be permanently anchored along the river. Toxins such as PCB and PFAS continue to poison our river, while cleanup efforts are still unfinished. Indian Point decommissioning remains controversial. Locally, there are indications that the City of Beacon is looking into ways to reduce their composing and recycling services.

But we are prepared. We welcome the challenges and opportunities that 2024 brings.

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## Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, January 5, recorded by Trish Murphy

Opening Music: Rob May performed the classic song "This Land is Your Land" by Woody Guthrie.

President Rob May called the meeting to order at 7:32 p.m. He opened the meeting with a cheerful Happy Birthday song to Rosemary.

Guest Speaker: The Environmental Action Director of Clearwater, Jen Benson, gave valuable information about the Hudson River PCB superfund site. She stated that reviews of the site are done every five years and the third review will be held this year. The review will include such things as the success of dredging, for example. The goal of the program is to ultimately make the consumption of fish from the river safe. Other priorities include the decommissioning process of Indian Point. The harmful implications of invasive species in the Hudson were also explored. The possible redesignation of Hudson River anchorages was discussed next. The formation of The Stewart Air National Guard Restoration Advisory Committee and their efforts to remove pollutants from the water was brought to the attention of listeners. She advised members that due to PCB's pregnant women and children should not consume the contaminated fish and should not consume more than six crabs weekly from the Hudson River.

Treasurer's Report: Aaron Verdile presented the income and expenses for November. Please refer to the treasurer's report for complete information. The budget review was followed by a budget proposal. The budget was unanimously voted in and the motion to pass the budget was approved.

Winter Lecture Series: Alan Thomas announced that as part of the winter lecture series, Bill Davies would come to speak about the history of competitive rowing. A professor of geology will also come at a separate future date to lecture on climate change. On March 21, the former Executive Director of Clearwater, John Mylod, will speak about the history of Hudson Valley fisheries. The speaker for April will be determined at a later date.

Woody Report: James Stated that the Woody is currently tarped over and safely secured for winter storage and remains in good working order. Spring maintenance is set to begin either in February or March. Possible future work parties will be arranged at a later date. Winter maintenance volunteers are needed.

Harbor Report: The harbor remains safely secured and stored for the winter.

MLK March: Matt Bowen stated that the Martin Luther King March would be held on Monday January 15 at 9:30 a.m., starting in front of the Springfield Baptist Church. The gathering at the church is set to begin at 8:30 a.m. and the ceremony in the church will commence at 8:45 a.m. He stated that the parade was extended by two blocks this year. At 11:30 a.m. there will be a ceremony following the parade which includes various activities and engaging speakers. Matt informed listeners that copies of the songs to be sung at the event are available upon request. The talk concluded with thanks being given to Matt Bowen and Bonnie Champion. Environmental Report: Captain Tom explored the repercussions of using drier sheets and Tide Pods in terms of the plastic contained in the latter items being released into the environment in the form of harmful pollutants. He encouraged listeners to use powdered detergent or Borax be used in lieu of other products that contain plastics. The relation of the oil industry to plastic waste was also discussed. Captain Tom concluded by providing interesting facts about the negative implications of disposable plastic packaging.

General Announcements: Captain Tom stated that any members wishing to visit Fran, a Sloop Club member recovering from a medical condition at a facility in Mohegan Lake, should contact him. Members are encouraged to visit Fran. It was them stated that the opening swim date for the riverpool is currently July 27. Listeners learned that the N.Y. Swim Initiative was confirmed and as a result Governor Hochul's executive planning director had inquired about the riverpool and discussed the allocation of funds to such. It was learned that Scenic Hudson voted not to approve a site for the designation of an area for an adult pool. The announcements were wrapped up with the availability of the resource library in the clubhouse being brought to attention. It was revealed three new books had been donated to the library and were available for use.

Adjournment: Rob May made a motion to adjourn and the motion was seconded. Rob May adjourned the meeting at 8:37 p.m. The meeting was followed by a Circle of Song.

Clearwater Environmental Action director, Jen Benson was a guest speaker at the January membership meeting, reviewing Clearwater's priorities for the upcoming year and updating us on the latest fish advisories.

Many, especially underserved populations, in the Hudson Valley rely on fish from the Hudson River as a supplemental food source. Sadly, after eight years of remediation and additional recovery time, stringent advisories limiting consumption remain in effect.

The EPA is due to issue its 5-Year Review and make a protectiveness determination this year. Public involvement will help ensure a lasting solution. Renewing your Clearwater membership and joining the email list are great ways to stay informed.

#### THE BIGGER, BETTER, BOTTLE BILL

State Senate Bill number 237-B, introduced by senator May, et. al., and assembly bill number 6353, introduced by assemblyman Glick, et. al. proposes to amend the environmental conservation law, in relation to returnable bottles. It would expand and modernize of the state's Bottle Bill by adding wine, liquor, distilled spirit coolers, and cider and wine products to the definition of "beverage", increasing the container deposit from five cents to ten cents, and providing that beginning April 1, 2025, the handling fee will be six cents for each beverage container accepted by a deposit initiator from a dealer or operator of a redemption center.

#### The New York Packaging Reduction and Recycling Infrastructure Act

Senate Bill 4246-a (Harckham) and Assembly Bill 5322-a (Glick) aims to reduce packaging by 50% gradually over the next twelve years. Most consumer products companies would be required to reduce single-use plastic packaging or redesign packaging to be refillable.

The bill targets reducing the impact on environmental justice communities where packaging is produced, landfilled, or incinerated.

The bill prohibits PFAS, vinyl chloride, lead, mercury, formaldehyde, bisphenols, and other carcinogenic, endocrine disrupting, or otherwise harmful chemicals to be used in food packaging.

#### A Brief History of Rowing on the Hudson



We were honored to have Bill Davies from the Hudson River Rowing Association kickoff the Winter Lecture Series to a full house. We were a bit worried with the temperature dipping below 20 degrees and two floods in the week before, but a great topic and publicity brought out the crowd.

By now most folks know something about *The Boys in The Boat,* and their quest to beat the Nazi's in the1936 Olympics. Fewer realize that the trials were held on the Hudson River in Poughkeepsie.

We learned that competitive rowing began on the Hudson in the 1700's, with many stars of the sport hailing from Newburgh or Poughkeepsie. By 1895 the collegiate championship regatta was taking place on the Hudson due to its long straight course and viewing opportunities.

At their peak the regattas brought tens of thousands of people to the riverside. They were the revivals of their day. The HRRA has been bringing competitive rowing back to the area at the club, high school, and college levels.

Thank you to Bill for his time and enthusiasm. Also, a special thank you to John Greener, Jim Finnigan, Konstantin Doren, Rob May and Rosemary Thomas for the extra effort getting the clubhouse ready after the flooding.

## Winter Lecture Series - February



#### How Earth Scientists Learn About Climate Change w/ Kirsten Menking, Ph.D., Thursday Feb. 15<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm Beacon Sloop Club, 2 Red Flynn Dr., Beacon, NY.

Join us as Dr. Menking discusses the use of sediment cores from Lakes Minnewaska and Mohonk to reconstruct the climate history of the Shawangunk Ridge. Kirsten Menking and her students at Vassar College took sediment cores from the bottom of Lakes Minnewaska and Mohonk and analyzed them to reconstruct the climate history of the Shawangunk Ridge over the past 15,000 or so years. Using pollen, plant fossils, charcoal content and other indicators, they determined what the landscape must have looked like at the time of the mastodons and also uncovered a nearly two millennia drought that occurred several thousand years ago.

Kirsten Menking, Professor of Earth Science and Director of Environmental Studies on the Althea Ward Clark Chair at Vassar College, conducts research on past climate change, on landscape evolution due to climatic and tectonic processes, and on the impacts of urbanization on streams. Recently she has worked on the climate record contained within Lake Estancia in central New Mexico and on the late glacial and Holocene history of southeastern New York. The latter work has taken her to lakes in the Shawangunk Mts. and to Lozier Pond, a small lake from

## Commercial Fishing on the Hudson River w/ John Mylod Thursday Mar. 21<sup>st</sup> at 7:00 pm Beacon Sloop Club, 2 Red Flynn Dr., Beacon, NY.

Join John Mylod and learn about the natural history of shad, herring, sturgeon, blue crabs, and the history of the Hudson River fishery.

Albany was once known as 'Sturgeontown' due to the large amounts of 'Albany Beef' caught in the Hudson River. Shad nets and fishing weirs were once a sign of spring all along the river. At the time of the first European's arrival the river was teeming with fish, sustaining a native population with its bounty.

In the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century commercial fishing provided employment to a large number of fishermen both on the New York and New Jersey sides of the Hudson River.

In the 20<sup>th</sup> century fish populations declined due to pollution and overfishing, much of it offshore, and l but disappeared.


