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# **Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting**

#### Minutes, June 7, recorded by Trish Murphy

#### **Opening music**

President Rob May delighted listeners with a lovely classic folk song as he played the guitar.

#### **Opening Announcements**

The meeting began with all individuals present participating in a moment of silence to honor the passing of our long term treasured member Kip Touraine. After president Rob May canvassed members, Thor was kind enough to volunteer to take the garbage, Gail was thanked for being the "Multrum Hero" for this month and Max Smith was given recognition for being next month's " Multrum Hero". New members Carol and Linda were given a warm welcome.

#### **Treasurer's Report**

Aaron provided listeners with the latest Treasurer's report (See Treasurer's report for full details). No members had thoughts or questions pertaining to the report.

#### **Strawberry Festival**

Rosemary began her reporting by encouraging volunteers to come forward. Saturday involves setting up tents, including the large strawberry tent, which boasts a center pole which was hand carved from a pine tree by Pete Seeger himself! Volunteers will meet both at the riverfront park and "The Yard" in Beacon (for the strawberry prep party).

The event is proud to support a plastic free environment and volunteers will be placed at the various sorting stations to separate debris. It was revealed Blu and another member graciously volunteered to sleep in the park to guard the expensive equipment. Joyce concluded the report by revealing the new strawberry festival shirts.

#### Woody/Harbor Report

Captain Steve opened the report by informing listeners that the Woody will be out of service for approximately one week after the Strawberry Festival so that the boat could be rewired to meet Coast Guard standards by an experienced professional marine electrician.

The announcement was made that our very own Sloop club is now the owner of the "Long Dock" due to the recent purchase of such for \$500.00, a small fraction of its value.

Gail came forward to express her dissatisfaction of the purchase in relation to the secrecy of the board to the general members about the pending and final purchase. It was revealed that John McLaughlin had mentioned the purchase at the previous meeting, but this announcement was not entered into last month's minutes (due to the confidential nature of the matter – minutes are online).

Alan addressed Gail's concern with the explanation that the executive committee is empowered to make decisions where speed is critical. This opportunity caught us by surprise. Alan went on to explain that the information was not kept from the general membership due to it being controversial in nature, but rather because we were in contract negotiations with multiple parties. Other parties that may have direct and indirect ties to the club could have learned of the pending dock sale and put it in jeopardy.

It was very clear to the executive committee that access to the dock is critical to our mission. The leadership deeply values the members and their opinions.

#### AED/CPR/First aid classes

Are available for the deeply discounted rate of \$25.00 per member(\$50.00 for nonmembers) The Sloop club's very own Antony will be offering the public the invaluable opportunity to become AED/CPR certified. Participants can add on additional First Aid training which will be provided at the end of the class for \$10.00. Classes will take place from 9am-1pm at the Beacon volunteer ambulance corp.

#### New BSC Hats

Alan displayed the stylish new Sloop club hats which are available at the cost of \$25.00 to members \$30.00 for nonmembers. All proceeds benefit the Beacon Sloop club.

#### Sailing Class

Mary Arnold, coordinator and facilitator of the sailing class, stated that certificates had been given out upon completion of the eight-week sailing class to participants.

#### **Riverpool/Class River Swim**

Alan Zolner was proud to announce the coming of the 20th Cross River swim. The profits from the Cross River swim are allocated to the river pool. It was a dream of Pete and Toshi Seeger to give residents the ability to swim in the Hudson. Due to Governor Kathy Hochul's swim initiative we are witnessing Beacon's swim pools being adopted in other areas of the Hudson. Therefore, it is literally like seeing the dream of the iconic Pete Seeger and his beloved wife being spread up and down the Hudson. Volunteers are welcomed.

#### **Clearwater report**

Rosemary informed listeners that six weeks ago there was a call to raise a minimum of \$250,000 dollars and thus far \$347,000 had been raised. She invited all to support Clearwater members or participants in the "Paddle for the Hudson" fundraiser program. The fundraiser goes until July 26th concluding with a celebration on August 3rd. Rosemary proudly announced the start of "Pay What You Can Sails" by Clearwater.

#### **Environmental Report**

Captain Tom stated that a new bill aimed at reducing plastic packaging by 50% over the next twelve years had been passed that very day by a 37 to 23 Margin. Hopefully this bill will reduce plastics in the environment and dangerous microplastics in the human body.

#### **General Announcements**

Joyce announced that the Sloop club had been given the opportunity to care for the pollinator garden located at the entrance of the dock. Members can sign up to volunteer through Joyce. Vicky stated that June 15 at the Yard is family pride day from 1-5 followed by a dance party from 5-9. A member brought to attention the possible expansion of a pipeline that runs through Dover and Athens. A member suggested we proposition appropriate sources to provide public restrooms by the docks to inhibit people from urinating on the Sloop club property.

#### Adjournment

A motion to Adjourn was made and seconded at 8:52 PM. Circle of song followed.

# The Supreme Court Upends the Chevron Deference, Impacting Regulatory Agencies.

The Chevron deference was established by a Supreme Court ruling in 1984 which allowed regulatory agencies, such as the EPA, latitude to make reasonable interpretations of laws which Congress had left ambiguous or vague, and required the courts to defer to the agency's expertise.

While the ruling was not retroactive and does not reverse the 70 Supreme Court decisions and more than 17,000 lower court decisions based on the 1984 precedent, it opens new opportunities to challenge a wide range of established federal rules and regulations.

Chief Justice John G. Roberts Jr., writing for the majority, said that "agencies have no special competence" and that judges should determine the meaning of federal laws. While that may be true in a legal sense, critics point out that many regulations are based on specialized scientific and technical knowledge, beyond the experience and technical skill of most judges and congressmen.

In a dissenting opinion, Justice Elena Kagan wrote, "A rule of judicial humility gives way to a rule of judicial hubris."

The implications of this ruling go far beyond the environment, to fraud protection, food and drug safety and more. Unless Congress takes action to empower the regulators, this will be a huge setback of all we have fought for more than 50 years.

Think about how long it has taken to establish rules for pollutants, over 30 years for forever chemicals, and then think about how long it would take if each one required an act of congress, was subjected to special interests and politics.

## **Danskammer Energy Pauses**

On June 8, 2023, Danskammer notified the state administrative law judge that it will not challenge recent rulings and asked that its appeal be paused for one year, at which time Danskammer would either withdraw the application or modify the project and submit a new application.

The judge previously ruled that emissions from the plant would interfere with state climate goals and that the New York state's DEC had authority to deny Danskammer an air pollution permit.
