Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, March 1, recorded by Trish Murphy

Opening Music

Ken Miller and Rob May performed a charming classic folk song.

Opening Announcements

After no volunteers came forward, President Rob May offered to remove the trash. Gale kindly came forward to remove the recycles. New attendees Mark, Corrine, and Guy were welcomed by all.

Guest Lecture

Emily Skydel, an organizer with "Food and Water Watch", began her presentation by passing around a petition opposing new compressor stations currently proposed to be developed in Athens and Dover N.Y. for members to sign. Listeners were urged to contact Governor Hochul and plead with her to not allow pipeline expansion or development. A meeting will be held in Dover at El Universal Restaurant from 5 to 7 p.m. to discuss the stop of the pipeline. Food and Water Watch advocated reduced usage of fossil fuels and is actively involved in related issues. Emily informed listeners of the inspiring fact that New York State was moving away from the use of fossil fuels in a plethora of ways. One example is a climate law was passed in 2019. Another example is the "Electric Building Act" which will outlaw natural gas and other fossil fuels in all new buildings less than seven stories tall starting in 2026 and all new construction, no matter what the height, by 2029, in contrast to the current proposal to expand a gas pipeline that would cut through Dutchess County.

Treasurer's Report

(Refer to treasurer's report for full accounting details). Aaron stated that Common Ground Farms sent a very kindly worded letter of thanks to our club for our donation of \$1,080.00 for the Food Donation Program.

Winter Lecture Series

Alan stated that Kirsten Menking presented a lecture on climate change in February. The March lecture will be held on March 21, and will be hosted by John Mylod, the former Executive Director of Clearwater. He is set to speak about commercial fishing, fish life cycles, local fishing history, and other interesting fishing related topics. Fliers are distributed and are available. The April speaker is TBD.

Sailing Classes

President Rob May informed listeners that sailing classes are set to begin on April 17. There will be a total of eight classes. The online registration for sailing classes is active and available. An inquiry was made by a member as to the nature of the classes. James replied to the inquiry by explaining that the classes are designed to reinforce sailing knowledge for seasoned sailors or teach novices vital practical sailing facts and techniques. At the conclusion of the classes, a final test based on class content and textbook information will be administered on small boat sailing theory.

Woody Report

Members were asked to provide physical assistance to maintain the Woody eight days from the meeting.

A sailor meeting will be held at 9 a.m. in Haverstraw and the work party will commence at 10 a.m. The rain date is scheduled for March 16.

Clearwater Report

Rosemary opened by informing listeners that three webinars on environmental topics are to take place. They will eventually be available for viewing on YouTube. The Gala is scheduled for April 7. Clearwater is currently in the process of raising the \$12,000.00 that is costs to purchase a new jib sail. Necessary wood for the boat is likely to be provided from a rare white oak that fell in the Danish Royal Forest, valued at approximately \$42,000.00.

Environmental Report

Captain Tom opened the report by discussing the numerous benefits of powdered detergent and the wide array of detrimental impacts that liquid detergent has on both the human body and the environment. He emphasized the importance of taking various measures to limit the induction of microplastics into the body and the environment. Listeners were urged to embrace ecofriendly packaged boxed water.

General Announcements

Members were asked to volunteer in order to reassemble the River Pool on June 22 from 9:00 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on June 23 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. They were also asked to come forward to assist with the Cross River Swim which is set to be held on July 27 with a rain date of July 28 from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. J.C. Calderon stated that he was appointed by the Mayor of Beacon to lead the development efforts on Fishkill Avenue. He stated that local residents will soon have the ability to attend meetings focused on public space improvement. Residents will be given the opportunity at these meetings to voice their opinions in an attempt to convince the mayor to leave some public space void of development. A member came forward to speak who stated that he formally resided in Pennsylvania and while living there bore witness to the devastating impact that the presence of a gas pipeline has on its surroundings. He also stated that he is currently constructing a cedar plank and oak frame boat that can optimally be used for club sailing classes following its completion. Another member came forward to speak about the recent tragedy in Hawaii that resulted in the deaths of hundreds of civilians and over a thousand missing people that he believed to be caused due to the use of an energy weapon. Matt, the chairperson for the MLK parade, explained in detail the cost of the event and also stated that next year the expenditures would be covered by donations. Lydia Adams Davis invited all to come to the Town Crier Cafe in Beacon on April 7 from 6-8 p.m. to listen to her and Patrick Stanfield Jones perform.

Adjournment

Matt made a motion to dismiss which was seconded by President Rob May. The meeting was adjourned at 8:28 p.m. followed by the Circle of Song.

Environmental News The Hudson River Protection Act passed the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee.

This bipartisan bill, crafted by democrat Pat Ryan and co-sponsored by republicans Marc Molinaro and Mike Lawler, is part of the Coast Guard Reauthorization Act. The legislation would clarify geographic definitions that were used to skirt regulations and ban additional anchorages. As part of the larger reauthorization, it's now on track to pass the House and be passed by the Senate.

"Getting anything through this Congress is not easy. But we owe it to our kids, our seniors, and future generations to fight tooth and nail to protect our Hudson River and get this bill across the finish line," **said Congressman Pat Ryan.** "Never again will big corporations be able to turn our Hudson River into a parking lot for dangerous barges. This victory proves that when our community stands up with one voice to demand change, we can accomplish anything."

It is extremely gratifying to see the community and our representatives come together on this issue and we thank all our members who spoke up and fought for change. We must continue to remain vigilant, as we have seen many times, where profit is involved health, safety and the environment are often secondary.

Friends of a Clean Hudson Coalition (FOCH) Call on the EPA to Act

At press conference, organized by Pete Harckham, Senate Environmental Conservation Committee Chairman, Assemblywoman Carrie Woerner, and FOCH, the participants called on the EPA to take further action to remediate PCB contamination, contending that the five-year review due in April will show that the cleanup goals have not been met and that EJ communities have been disproportionately affected.

FOCH is led by Hudson River Sloop Clearwater, Riverkeeper, and Scenic Hudson.

Winter Lecture Series - March



Commercial Fishing on the Hudson River w/ John Mylod & Tom Lake

We were so excited to host John Mylod and Tom Lake, who between them know more about the Hudson River and its natural history than anyone. Both have spent decades on the river as commercial fishermen and students of the ecosystem.

The Hudson River fishery has been a significant food source for more than 10,000 years, as evidenced by archeological sites where bands of hunter-gathers, cued by signs of spring, met to catch and dry shad. One such site was unearthed here in Beacon during construction of the bridge.

Today many of the once robust populations of fish, including the American shad, have declined or are under threat due to modern human activity, including overfishing, power plant cooling systems, pollution, and climate change. All fishing for shad in the Hudson was banned in 2010, but the fish have not returned in the numbers hoped for.

Most of the commercially fished species are anadromous, spending their adult life in the ocean and returning to the river and its tributaries to spawn. Shad and sturgeon ocean habitats range from the Carolinas to the Bay of Fundy. There are few controls on the coastal fishery and modern trawling techniques are getting more and more sophisticated. It is believed that overfishing in the ocean is limiting the effectiveness of local actions.

Today, commercial fishing is viable only for blue crabs and herring (blue backs and alewife). There is hope, sturgeon appear to be coming back, power plants are closing (Indian Point), dams are being removed, thanks in part to your actions. We must be vigilant as new threats such as anchorages for large vessels and invasive species appear.
