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Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting Minutes, May 3, 2013

The meeting began at 7:32 p.m. with "This Little Light of Mine". David Eberle announced that the club would celebrate Pete Seeger's 94th birthday. The club sang "Happy Birthday" as cake was cut and passed out. New guests were welcomed from Jerusalem, Israel, as well as throughout New York and Connecticut.

Sarah Elisabeth gave the treasury report. The closing balance is \$87,212. David Eberle announced that Ken Miller's birthday party fundraiser raised \$250 for the club. David also asked that anyone with announcements at the end of the meeting keep their remarks under two minutes in length.

Tom LaBarr gave the Woody report. The Woody is at White's Marina and work parties are on Saturdays and Sundays. Hope Altkin asked Tom to remind everyone that White's is in New Hamburg, NY and work parties begin at 9:00 a.m. Tom also noted that work has been going on on Mondays at 4:00 p.m. David Eberle announced that the moorings are in place in the harbor and new buoys that meet Coast Guard regulations have been installed.

Saul Rozinksy gave the Building Committee report. The wall has been built and the area behind the stove will be covered with stone. Saul also announced that a work party on May 4th would be held to dig a trench to lay a power line to the Woody's charging dock.

Several club members discussed the Strawberry Festival. The Strawberry Fest will be June 9th. Tom LaBarr announced that on June 8th at 10:00 there will be a prep party at his house in Beacon where about a third of the strawberries will be prepared. Contact Tom for directions. Rosemary Thomas reminded the club that the key to a successful festival is for everyone to volunteer, then explained the arrangement of the tent. Susan Berliner discussed the club's continuing effort to have zero waste. We would like for there to be several volunteers at the recycling and compost stations to ensure that everything is placed in the proper bin. Susan also announced a work party at Tom LaBarr's house on May 18th at 10:30 to paint new cans. David Cohen reminded that club that in addition to the preparations at Tom's house the day before, lots of work goes on to prepare the park, including assembly of the strawberry tent and laying a water line. Prep day work is followed by a party at Tom LaBarr's.

Alan Thomas announced that the final environmental lecture for this year will be a film showing on May 17th at the Sloop Club at 7:00 p.m. about the construction of a wooden schooner. Alan also announced that the club's fundraiser showing the film *Chasing Ice* was a great success.

Joyce Hanson announced that on August 18th there will be a concert with David and Jakob Bernz and Hope Machine as the second annual Woody Guthrie celebration concert.

Don Raskopf announced a film showing at the Sloop Club on May 5th of the anti- fracking film *Dear Governor Cuomo*. David Eberle announced that the May 11th river sweep will begin at 8:00 a.m. at the Sloop Club. In addition to cleanup work, there will also be an art showing and an evening concert.

Manna Jo Greene thanked the Sloop Club's newsletter creators. Manna also announced that the plan to sell Central Hudson to Fortis was recommended against by the Public Service Commission. Fortis is well known for its poor environmental record. Manna also asked that the club's environmental committee consider a health and safety resolution. Later in the meeting Jim Krivo announced that Newburgh, New Paltz, Kingston, and other cities have publicly opposed the merger but Beacon still has not.

Connie Hogarth announced that on Tuesday, June 11th there will be a dinner for the New York Civil Liberties Union in Hastings. One of the honorees is Manna Jo Greene.

Frances Cott announced that local governments are now permitted to prevent fracking within their own borders, so we may now contact our local officials about the issue. Ed Hauffman reiterated Frances' statement and asked BSC members to call state senator Mark Grisante's office in support of S. 673, a bill which would outlaw fracking.

Dan Einbender announced a concert on May 12th outside Albany with Pete and Peggy Seeger.

Sue Rosenberg announced on May 19th at 2:00p.m. will be a film called "Bitter 70" about gas drilling on public lands shown in Woodstock.

The meeting broke at 8:30 p.m.

Fortis/CH Energy Merger Update

Administrative law Judges Rafael Epstein and David Prestemon issued an advisory decision that the public benefits of the deal do not outweigh the risks and that mitigation plans were not adequate. The judges noted the importance of community relations to the utility company mission and suggested that the state Public Service Commission, consider modifications to the plan to change the risk/benefit balance.

The commission must now decide whether to hold additional hearings on the plan before ruling approving or modifying the deal. Filings are due by May 17. The judge's ruling may be found at:

that swelling can begin. The boat needs to be at least 80% swelled before she can go into the water. Once in the water she needs the mast stepped, rigging completed, and the motor installed before returning to Beacon.

John McLaughlin will not be here from May 24 until June 3. So the captains will be coordinating the final activities needed get the boat to her first festival, which is the Riverfest in Cornwall on June 1. That is quickly followed by the Strawberry Festival and the Hudson River Revival the next two weekends so dust off you life vests, practice your bowlines, and come out to help. We need everyone one of you. New recruits and sailor wannabes are very welcome.

There is still work to do on the docks, moorings to place, and ongoing maintenance throughout the year. If you are a boat owner and haven't done so get your mooring fee to Kip Touraine and come out to put in your hours. There is also plenty of opportunities for non-boat owners too.

Hello Woody Sailors and Volunteers

We will be sailing the Sloop Woody Guthrie down to Croton for **Clearwater's Great Hudson River Revival**, on June 15 and 16, and we will need lots of helpful volunteers both on Land and on Sea to make this a success. We anticipate being able to utilize the stairway/floating dock arrangement from last year to load guests from the shore-line bulkhead directly onto our Sloop. These are some of the jobs necessary to make this vast undertaking a success:

Transiting the Woody down to Croton on June 14th and returning her to Beacon on Monday June 17th

Anchor Watch on the Woody overnight. (Sleeping on board)

For 8 to 10 hours of work for the Woody; you will have full weekend access to the festival grounds and music venues, access to the Volunteer Food Tent 2 Volunteer Parties Saturday night and receive a Clearwater Volunteer T-Shirt.


