Beacon Sloop Club General Meeting

Minutes, November 3, recorded by Vicki Fox/Mary Arnold

Opening song: Sailing Up, Sailing Down, Ken Miller, Ben Mazur, Mary Poppiins and Annie.

President Rob reminded us that this is a carry in/carry out facility. Tom Elliott volunteered to take out the recyclables; Bonnie Champion volunteered to take out the garbage. Rob congratulated Gail Moran for being this month's Multrum Hero. We still need one for December. Rob welcomed firsttime attendees.

Treasury Report: Aaron Verdile reviewed the numbers for September.

Pumpkin Festival: Tom LaBarr, "we had it; it was fun." Mary Poppiins, "I sold all my hats. Whoever took the pictures, I want to thank you. God bless each and every one of you." Rosemary, "Special thanks to Joyce and Patricia for all they did. Joyce has taken the vendors to a new level. It's a big job. Joyce, "The music was extraordinary, on both stages."

Holiday Sing: Susan announced that it will be on December 9. The time will be set shortly. A lot of people say it's one of their favorite events. It's beautiful. Aaron does an amazing job decorating, and an amazing job with the sound. All our favorite musicians come and lead songs. We get to sing. It's a Potluck; everyone brings desserts and finger foods. Expect to spend your evening singing.

Joyce: Again, this year it is a fundraiser (\$s, not food items) for Common Ground Farm's food donation program. They donate over 12,000 pounds of food to Fairground, soup kitchens, mutual aide, and churches. We have been partnering with them and supporting them. Last year, we raised over \$1,000. Write your check to Beacon Sloop Club, on bottom, say donation for Common Ground. We are their partners, listed on their website.

Woody Report: Steve Schwartz. I would like to say how pleased I am that the Woody Report is only four down from the top of the agenda. The Woody went down to Haverstraw today at 6 am. in the morning. It was a bit chilly, but an easy trip down. There will be work parties to build a frame and put a tarp on it. Tomorrow there is a work party to disassemble the charging dock and take the dock by oars over to the long dock at 10 a.m. Low tide at 11:33 tomorrow.

We received a \$5,000 grant from the Hyde and Watson Foundation, due to efforts of James Malchow and Alan. The grant is for electrical work on the Woody, having the boat rewired to coast guard standards by a professional marine mechanic. We are not a coast guard inspected vessel but want to keep it up to standards for safety and insurance purposes. This grantor, once they recognize the value of a program, tends to offer continuing support for infrastructure improvement.

Harbor Report: Mary/Steve. Harbor Work: starts tomorrow. The moorings are coming out tomorrow and Sunday. The following weekend, the docks will be disassembled. Also of interest, Tom L mentioned at the executive committee, an opportunity to partner with the Town of Fishkill to invest money (apply for grants) to upgrade our charging dock and possibly all the docks. **MLK March and Essay Contest**: Bonnie, "it's been my pleasure to organize the Martin Luther King parade and essay contest. It's not a good idea to have the same person leading an organization for years and years and years." The new chairman is Matt Bowen

Matt: Congratulated Bonnie for heading it up for last 10 years. "I'm thrilled to take this on."

Bonnie: We really need peace in the world. We need a Martin Luther King quote about peace as a topic for the essay contest. My favorite line is from a fourth grader is "Martin Luther King wanted to change the world. That's a big job."

There will be a November 14 zoom meet and greet, at 7 p.m.

Clearwater Report: Rosemary: The Clearwater will come out of water this year for coast guard inspection, painting. We are working on restoration/preservation, and you may get appeals for that.

Environmental action: EPA, upcoming release of draft of 5-year review how the cleanup is going. Clearwater and partners are hosting a public briefing, Tuesday Nov 14 on Zoom 5:30 to 6:30. This is a public briefing.

Nominations for 2024 Officers: Alan reminded us that you must be a member in good standing to participate in the election process. He will have a membership list and forms available before the December meeting.

The following people were nominated from the floor: President: Rob May, Vice-president: Vince Farina, Secretary: Mary Arnold (declined), Treasurer: Aaron Verdile.

There was a discussion on the duties of the secretary and a call for volunteers. We need a secretary.

Environmental Report: Tom LaBarr reported on a NYT article on the energy consumed by AI and Bitcoin. If trends continue, they will consume the same amount of energy as a medium-sized country.

He also reported on a study debunking fears of people being trapped in electric vehicles during blizzards that are being spread on social media. The simulated study showed that in 12hrs of being trapped in traffic at 20 degs., only 25% of the battery capacity was used.

Announcements: Jovce auctioned off two items, the proceeds to go the Holiday Sing Fundraiser. Mary Poppiins passed out local papers with articles about the Woody and the Pumpkin Festival. Vince offered free spider plants to anyone wishing to take one home. Bonnie thanked April Mae and the June Bugs for last Friday's concert. Gail reminded us that new CG rules would allow anchoring of large ships north of the Tappen zee. Alan Zollner announced that Riverpool's annual meeting is November 18, 10 am, at the Stonykill Environmental Center. They will publish a Zoom link as well. Merrick Lemme. a local student, said that he has been trying to convince his friends to come. They are reluctant to join because they are not very social. He asked that we accommodate them if they come to the next meeting.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) plans to release its draft third Five Year Review (FYR) of the Hudson River PCBs Superfund Site for public comment this winter. Through these reviews, required under the federal Superfund law, EPA reports on the status of the cleanup and issues a determination as to whether the selected cleanup remedy is working as intended and is protective of human health and the environment.

Join Scenic Hudson, Riverkeeper, and Hudson River Sloop Clearwater for a virtual update about the Hudson River PCBs Superfund Project. Friends of a Clean Hudson (FOCH) has been a river-wide coalition for decades focused on monitoring PCB cleanup in the Hudson River.

U.S. Coast Guard Reverses Policy on Hudson River Anchoring

The Coast Guard, following the outcry from environmental organizations and local officials, has reversed the policy it adopted in July allowing large commercial vessels to anchor anywhere north of Tarrytown. The Coast Guard's new rule temporarily restores the geographic scope of the Port of New York to encompass the Hudson River from New York Harbor to Albany, N.Y, permitting only the designated Hyde Park Anchorage Ground.

As the Coast Guard considers future changes to its anchoring regulations and policies, it will be collecting public comments and feedback through a process called a Notice of Inquiry. This is a process that we must participate in in order to safeguard the health of the river and our communities.


