Susan honored James for his service as President. Susan now becomes President. The executive board appointed James as the Vice President.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> by Aaron. Aaron provided the financial report for August and the Corn Festival.

<u>Woody Report</u> by Jim Birmingham: The boat is in the water and we are sailing it now. We only have a couple of more weeks left and still doing sailor training. We sail five nights a week and start time depends on the captain. There is a specific space that is allowed for parking. We would like to keep the boat in the water, which is better for the hull. We are still working out the storage location. The Woody will sail during the Pumpkin Festival at 12:15/12:30 and sail on the hour.

<u>Nora's Celebration</u> by Nora: She wanted no presents and she is downsizing her existing stuff. She asks that we pass the donation basket to collect towards the beginning of a maintenance fund for the Woody as gifts to her.

<u>Building report</u> by David Eberle: The shed roof is collapsing as well as the flat area. We have a split tree. If you are available to work on the last Saturday of the month, please sign the sheet that is going around. Will start probably around 9:30am-10am.

<u>Pumpkin Festival</u> report by Rosemary(10/15): The fall means the pumpkin festival. This is our last fun event with a pie recipe that has been passed down for decades. Need volunteers for rolling crusts. We also need folks to be tasked with chili, merchandise, Woody, vendor setup, and pumpkin sales. Vince said this is a great time for families with kids running through the pumpkin patch. James said that breakdown for this festival is different because is it darker so we need folks to stick it out. Vince also said we need pumpkin movers. Thank you for fixing the solar trailer and flyers are being passed around.

Joyce talked about Reshad Tompson who walks on stilts. He is planning on coming. There are also ten pianos spread across town as the Keys to the City project. We are also getting a piano for the festival. We need to paint a pumpkin on the piano. The piano will be at the festival at 10am. Mighty volunteered to paint the piano at the festival. Your tiny masterpiece of ingenuity will be hung, along with all the other tiny masterpieces, at the Red Barn, waiting for you to show up and celebrate the *Woody*, your friends, and your imagination. There will be three \$50 People's Choice Awards: one for The Most Spectacular, one for The Most Creative, and one for The Funniest. You get to vote for each category.

But the fun has only just begun.

This event is also a silent auction. You set the starting bid for your canvas. Then each canvas will be auctioned off – the *Woody* gets half, and you get half. Plus, you get the opportunity to polish off all your holiday shopping in time to enjoy the rest of your holiday season!



The ferry sloop *Woody Guthrie* was commissioned by Pete Seeger in 1978 as part of his dream to preserve, protect and restore the Hudson River, by making the river accessible to anyone who wants to sail. For almost 40 years, the *Woody* has taken thousands of people for free sails on the river, but the years take a heavy toll on wooden boats. With your hard work and generous support, we completed the *Woody's* restoration in September, but now we must raise money for winter maintenance to continue its mission of free sunset sails to the public. You can help!

The Woody has been sailing almost every weeknight since her return to Beacon. It has been a real Hudson River fall sailing season with big wind and spectacular sunsets.

We've only taken out a few guests, as we are rebuilding and retraining our crews. There is still a need for more sailors, especially on Mondays and Tuesdays. There is only a week or two left, but it's still not too late to give it a try. No experience is needed, we will train you.

**Manna Jo Greene**, a longtime civil rights and environmental activist, who is currently serving as an Ulster County Legislator representing District 19 and is the Environmental Director for Hudson River Sloop Clearwater;

**Joanne Steele**, a long time women's rights activist and founder of the publication *The Majority Report*.

**Ruth Fairclothe**, a Minister to migrant farmworkers who has been in the forefront of empowering rural communities for decades, having helped found the youth organization UNITY, as well as the Daughters of Sarah, an ecumenical women's leadership development and support organization.

Janet Mills, a role model in her community as a nurturing woman who has stepped up consistently to help those in need.

**Darlene Pfeiffer**, an entrepreneur who not only owns multiple Kentucky Fried Chicken franchises, but who founded the Entrepreneurial Studies program at SUNY Ulster.
