We have had great support from our volunteers with large weekend work parties. Many hands make for light work. Alan Thomas reported that he and Wayne Chernek were embedded with the Rondout crew during the week and it was a great experience. There are many skilled and unskilled tasks that contribute to the efficiency of their team.

Family of Samuel Harrell Files Suit

The family of mentally ill inmate Samuel Harrell filed suit against the state, guards and prison officials on in federal court in White Plains.

The complaint said he was repeatedly kicked and stomped at Fishkill Correctional Facility while handcuffed, cursed with racial epithets, and thrown down a flight of stairs after the April 21 beating.

The incident came to light in a New York Times article published in August. U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara issued a statement last month saying that he was monitoring the case. The Woody Guthrie Restoration

Work has begun on the Woody Guthrie in the Ralph Allen Shed at the Hudson River Maritime Museum. With a combination of weekend work parties and embedded volunteers we have been a part of the process every step of the way.

The boat has been stabilized, shear strakes and upper planks have been removed, along with chain plates and other hardware to gain access to structural elements to be inspected or replaced. With the replacement of the shear clamps the first new wood was installed on Sept. 11.

I know I speak for all our volunteers when I say that it is a trip being part of a living exhibit. There has been a steady stream of folks wanting to learn about the boat, the club, and the project. It has been a great opportunity for outreach and demonstrating the power of community.

EPA Announces GE PCB Facility Shut Down

EPA project manager Gary Klawinski announced that GE was shutting down and dismantling up to half its operation because it is no longer needed. General Electric is showing every indication that they will claim to have met its obligation under the consent order with the Environmental Protection Agency. GE may temporarily dodge responsibility for the contaminated sediment in the Champlain Canal and un-dredged areas of the Hudson. There is room for optimism that eventually the cleanup will happen but at what cost in time and money?

New York State is constitutionally required to maintain a twelve-foot minimum depth in the canal to allow boat traffic. They have been unable to meet this obligation due to lack of facilities to address the PCB contamination in its sediments. GE currently has the resources and expertise to accomplish the task. Even if GE did not assume the full cost of the operation it is common sense that leaving their facilities in place would provide the most cost effective solution.

Beyond the dredging specified in the consent agreement are the damages and additional mitigations to be determined by the trustees made up of three federal agencies and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. Again it seems that the most cost effective mediation would be accomplished by a continuous cleanup plan.

Complicating the situation is GE's plan to move its corporate headquarters and Governor Coumo's attempts to bring them to New York State. As environmental groups, including the Beacon Sloop Club and local politicians continue to call on GE and the agencies involved to do the right thing the Governor's position remains unclear.




